

OPPORTUNITY TO SERVE ON TFN'S JUDICIAL COUNCIL

Executive Council is seeking TFN Member applicants for a vacancy on the Judicial Council. The TFN Judicial Council is appointed by Executive Council to 5-year terms, pursuant to the *Administrative Review and Judicial Proceedings Act*. The current TFN Member appointment is set to expire in June 2022.

The Judicial Council meets as required, in accordance with the instructions of the Chair of the Judicial Council, and has the following responsibilities:

- determining the validity of Tsawwassen laws,
- resolving disputes between Tsawwassen Members and elected officials,
- making recommendations to courts on the sentencing of Tsawwassen Members, if requested,
- investigating any financial irregularities that may occur,
- hearing appeals of administrative decisions,
- resolving disputes between Tsawwassen Members,
- resolving disputes between government bodies, and
- other duties that Executive Council may assign to it from time to time under any Tsawwassen enactment.

The hourly rate of pay for the TFN Member appointee is \$75 per hour.

All TFN Members are eligible to apply, however, you may not concurrently sit on Judicial Council and hold any other office with Tsawwassen Government or collect fees or a salary from Tsawwassen Government.

Dear TFN members and residents:

Please note that **starting May 1, 2022, the Revised Stage 1 Watering Restrictions come into effect, until October 15, 2022.** Stage 1 comes into effect automatically each year to prevent drinking water wastage and ensure water users employ efficient and effective watering practices.

The Greater Vancouver Water District (GVWD) Board approved revisions to the *Drinking Water Conservation Plan* (DWCP) at its October 29, 2021 meeting. The revisions include reducing lawn watering to one day per week during Stage 1. For additional information and restriction details, refer to "Metro Vancouver | Drinking Water Conservation Plan".

Reducing lawn watering remains the most effective way to ensure we are using our drinking water wisely during the summer months when demand is highest, and rainfall is lowest. One morning per week provides adequate watering time to maintain a healthy lawn and achieve further water use reductions.

Drinking Water Conservation Plan 2022 Update

FAQ for Member Jurisdiction Staff

Project Key Messages:

- Starting in 2022, from May 1 until October 15, lawn watering will only be permitted one day a week (Stage 1 watering restriction update).
- Reduced lawn watering is the most effective way to reduce seasonal demand for water and save treated drinking water for where it is needed most: for cooking, cleaning, and drinking.
 - o Typically, water demand increases by as much as 50 per cent in the summer, which is also when the region gets the least rain.
- Watering of trees, shrubs, and flowers has not changed and you can still water them on any day from 5:00 to 9:00 am if using a sprinkler, and on any day at any time if using a hand held hose, soaker hose, water container, or drip irrigation. There are no restrictions on watering of edible plants.
- If at some point during the summer we need to move to Stage 2 watering restrictions, lawn watering will not be permitted at all for residential or non-residential properties.
 - o The new lawn watering restrictions are expected to reduce the need to move to higher restriction stages during dry spells, which could impact certain businesses.
- In 2021, our region was confronted with the reality of the climate emergency and extreme weather conditions The heat dome in June and July, highlighted the need for more proactive measures to conserve the region's water supply.
 - o 2021 summer water use was unusually high due to a record-breaking heat wave.
 - We were only able to meet summer water demands due to the high snowpack, which we can't
 - Daily water consumption hit 1.79 billion litres on June 27, just shy of the 2 billion litre all-time high set in 2009.
- Water conservation is not just about water shortages. It is more effective and less costly to conserve water than it is to build new infrastructure.
 - o Long-range climate projections show that our region can expect longer summer dry spells and decreased winter snowpack, limiting future summer water availability.
 - o Metro Vancouver's per capita water use has been steadily declining for over a decade, but continued population growth - about 35,000 people every year - is expected to increase overall water demand in the coming years.
 - Using only the water we need ensures an efficient and relatively cost-effective water system by helping to defer the need for expensive infrastructure projects and the associated increases in water rates required to fund them.



SERVICES AND SOLUTIONS FOR A LIVABLE REGION



The Utilities Team at TFN takes a lot of pride in serving and contributing to our community. Part of our independence as a community involves our utilities managing our own sewage treatment. While doing so has many benefits, our system is much smaller, so we as a community need to be very careful of what we send down our drains and toilets. Here is a friendly reminder of what to keep out of your drains (and toilets) to avoid costly repairs in your home and/or TFN's sewer system.

Grease, oil and animal fats should never go down the drain! These items contribute mostly to maintenance costs within the sewage system causing build up, clogs, and poor sewer treatment. Grease causes issues from your household drain all the way to the sewage treatment plant and does not belong down the sink or toilet. Always dispose of any grease, oil and animal fats safely into the garbage or with other organics.

Baby Wipes, cosmetic wipes, paper towel, or tissues (Kleenex) – these products are never flushable and do not break down the same way as toilet paper does, all of them are a large contributor of clogs and expensive maintenance repairs.

Q-Tips, cotton pads, or band-aids – these items can easily clump together causing clogs in your household plumbing or at various points of the sewage collection system.

All menstrual products, condoms, and diapers – are designed to not break down in water and can be very large. Flushing these items will cause problems in your home or further in the system.

Dental Floss and hair – found in the sewage system wrapped around pumps. They do not degrade in water, can create a net, and get caught on everything; these items have contributed to very expensive maintenance repairs.

Cigarette Butts – do not break down in water and can cause clogs, it is also a waste of water to flush them and they contain toxic chemicals which pass through sewage treatment to the environment.

Kitty Litter – heavy and does not dissolve in water. The flow of waste from your home and within our system is not fast enough to move the kitty litter along and can result in large clogs involving costly maintenance.

Gum – does not break down in water, is sticky, and can attach itself to the insides of pipes causing clogs basically anywhere.

Medications – cannot be eliminated with sewage treatment, which results in toxic chemicals making their way into our environment or waterways. Old, unused medications should be disposed of at a local pharmacy and NEVER flushed.








TSAWWASSEN FIRST NATION TAX TRANSITION TFN TAX WORK UPDATE

Effective 2022, TFN will offer a subsidy on the ordinary income of impacted Members that will provide monthly payments of up to 99% of estimated PIT payable, subject to PIT revenues.

TFN has developed an application process for the TFN Personal Income Tax Mitigation Program with Deloitte.

To prepare for the application process, staff encourage eligible Members to have the following information easily accessible:

- Members estimated income for 2022 or previous year's income (2021) with proof such as a recent pay stub, T4, or a letter from your employer confirming income
- Members estimated income in Honoraria and Directors fees with proof such as copy of a pay stub, a copy of a cheque received, or other supporting documentation
- If applicable, Members estimated Pension Income
- If applicable, Members estimated Rental Income
- If applicable, Members estimated Dividend Income
- If applicable, Members estimated Business Income, Net of Expenses
- Member's estimated other income

MOSQUITOES

TSAWWASSEN FIRST NATION MOSQUITO CONTROL PROGRAM

April 2022

2022 Mosquito Control

Our team is on schedule to begin testing and treating for mosquito larva throughout TFN Lands at the beginning of May.

Testing is done by 'dipping' out samples of water and counting the larva present, as well as counting mosquitoes present in our traps. Several dip tests are performed in each location scheduled for testing from May to October, and traps are set throughout TFN Lands in summer.

Treatment takes place when the number of larva found in dip tests meet or exceed the treatment thresholds set by the Provincial Government. We use BTI, a non-residual pesticide designed to impact mosquito larva only.

Data collected includes technician names and certification numbers, date, location, and number of each species present in every dip test and trap. Collected data is used to direct our work, and is included in reporting to TFN staff and the Province of BC.

Common Culex mosquito larvae hang by distinct breathing siphons.



Culex mosquitoes prefer to feed on birds, which are the primary carriers of West Nile virus. Because Culex also feed on people and other animals, including horses, they are vectors of interspecies disease transmission.

There are 48 confirmed species and subspecies of mosquitoes in BC, and another 14 are known to reside just outside our borders.


Onni will be commencing Landscape work at the edge of the sidewalk on **Fisherman Way and around Cormorant drive**, starting March 28th, 2022.

Knotweed








What: Bamboo-like plant with hollow, upright, green stems with nodes and reddish speckles. Leaves can range from triangular to egg to heart-shaped and are often arranged in a zig-zag pattern. Not all knotweed plants may flower, but flowers can be pink to white to pale green.

Where: Everywhere, especially ditches or near watercourses, stockpiles, vacant lots, transportation corridors and gardens.

Why: Provincially noxious. Spreads rapidly and can compromise the integrity of buildings and other infrastructure.

Management: Flag off area, do not disturb and contact XXX. Do Not Mow, Cut or Burn.

Recommended Treatment: Phased, multi-season herbicide application (foliar spray or stem injection) by a certified and licenced applicator.

CRAB FISHERY REMINDER

Fisheries and Oceans Canada has asked our department to remind FSC crabbers that gear that is not found in compliance within DFO or TFN fisheries regulations can be seized, and fishers may incur penalties. TFN and DFO will continue patrols to monitor the crab fishery for compliance. FSC gear must be marked with floats, must have tags, escape rings and hatches must have rot-cord, affixed, and all operators must not exceed the fifty-trap limit. If any gear has been stolen or tampered with, please report this to the Delta Police non-emergency line at 604-946-4411 to file a report, if traps associated with a police report are recovered by DFO the traps may be reunited with the owner. 

2022 VESSEL REGISTRATION

As it is a new year those TFN members participating in TFN crab, salmon and eulachon fisheries must annually renew their vessels. By not filling out these forms' fishers will be ineligible for new or replacement crab trap tags and Economical Opportunity salmon fisheries, limited participation fisheries, and communal commercial opportunities. EAGLE FEATHER BUNDLE

Distribution of kits has been completed for lands-based members- The Natural Resources Department is now in the process of determining whether to facilitate lands-based workshop/online workshop or hybrid- please stay tuned for more details as they come.



An overdose advisory was issued by the Fraser Heath Authority on February 17, 2022 as there has been an increase in overdoes the past few days.

We have extra Naloxone kits at our office to take and our officers carry Naloxone on them at all times.

Key messages for people who use substances:

- Use less than you normally would
- Do a tester; try a little before your regular amount
- Try not to use alone, and if you do, have someone check on you
- Stagger use with friends so someone can respond if needed
- Know the signs of overdose (early signs may include unusual snoring, or taking less than 1 breath every 5 seconds)
- Call 9-1-1 quickly when you notice something isn't right (the Good Samaritan Drug Overdose Act provides immunity from simple possession charges for those who call 911 in the case of an overdose)
- If you suspect the overdose is caused by a suspected/confirmed benzo,
 communicate this when help arrives
- Provide breaths (every 5 seconds until the person regains consciousness or help arrives)
