


In Memory of World War Two Veteran
Albert Frank Nicholas Castor

August 15, 1922 - October 29, 1985



Albert Castor served Canada in the Second World War from January 8, 1943 to August 15, 1946. He joined the Canadian Army as a Trooper, and was promoted to Sergeant.

Albert's contributions earned him the 1939-45 Star, France & Germany Star, Defence Medal, and the Canadian Volunteer Service Medal & Clasp.

Albert was the son of Josephine Nahu (nee Williams) from Tsawwassen, brother of Ralph Nahu, and the first cousin of Rick Jacobs. He moved to Tsawwassen after the war, where he spent the remainder of his life.

Frederick "Rick" Lewis Jacobs (sq^waliqəm)
June 8, 1921–February 17, 2011



Rick Jacobs served Canada as a rifleman in the Second World War. He fought bravely and with honour at Juno Beach on June 6, 1944 with the third wave and fourth division of the Regina Rifle Regiment of the Royal Canadian Infantry Corps.

Rick's contributions earned him the 1939–45 Star, France & Germany Star, Defence Medal, and the Canadian Volunteer Service Medal & Clasp.

Rick also served his community as elected Chief of the Tsawwassen First Nation in the 1950s.

Clarence Morgan

December 22, 1920 - December 21, 2003



Clarence Morgan proudly served Canada in the Second World War.

Clarence was from Chehalis First Nation and married Constance “Connie” Jacobs of Tsawwassen on January 19, 1942.

Ralph William Leon Nahu

June 12, 1921–November 25, 1983



Ralph Nahu served Canada in the Second World War as a Leading Aircraftman with the Royal Canadian Air Force from September 15, 1942 to May 2, 1946.

He was awarded the Canadian Volunteer Service Medal for his contributions to Canada's war efforts.

Ralph was the son of Josephine Nahu (nee Williams) from Tsawwassen, brother of Albert Castor, and the first cousin of Rick Jacobs.

Albert, Joe, Wesley and Bill White proudly served Canada in the Second World War, along with their two cousins Fred and Arthur White.

Albert and Wesley each spent 16 months in the army, Joe served five months in the army and two years with the merchant marine, and Bill saw three and a half years of overseas service with the army.

Albert, Joe, Wesley and Bill were brothers-in-law to Isaac Williams, who married their sister Pearl White.

Walter John James Williams

Born June 6, 1924 - Killed in battle August 19, 1944



Walter John James Williams gave his life for Canada while serving as a Rifleman with the Regina Rifle Regiment (Royal Canadian Infantry Corps) in France during the Second World War.

Walter fought in Normandy and Caen, and was eventually killed in combat in the Battle for Falaise Pocket.

Walter—the son of August and Bertha Williams of Tsawwassen, and nephew of then-Chief Felix Williams—was believed to be the first Aboriginal soldier from the Lower Mainland to lose his life in World War II. He was only 20 years old.


Walter John James Williams

Walter's legacy is commemorated on page 479 of the *Book of Remembrance*.

Each year on October 13th, this page is displayed for public viewing in the Memorial Chamber of the Parliament of Canada in Ottawa.

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
